

First new District 6 Councilman in 12 years Welcome Our New Phoenix Councilman Kevin Robinson

Kevin Robinson was sworn in to office on April 17, 2023.

The 'new kid on the block' is a familiar face to many people in Arcadia and around District 6. Councilman Kevin Robinson is a

retired Phoenix PD Assistant Chief whose career began in the Arcadia neighborhood in 1980.

During his 36-plus years of service, Robinson had oversight of PPD's \$500 million annual budget as well as numerous other functions including responsibility over investigative units, air support unit, tactical and K-9 units as well as the uniformed patrol function.

He served as a board member for 17-plus years to the Ronald McDonald House Charities (RHMC) of Central and Northern Arizona, serving for two terms as its President of the Board while directing a successful multi-million dollar capital campaign.


In 2020, Robinson was selected by Arizona Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert Brutinel to serve on the Arizona Judicial Council (AJC). The AJC is a policy-making body that oversees the judicial system in Arizona. During the latter part of 2020, **former Arizona Governor Doug Ducey nominated Robinson** to fill a seat on the Arizona Police Officers Standards and Training Board (AZPOST). AZPOST stands to foster public trust and confidence by establishing and maintaining standards of integrity, competence, and professionalism for Arizona peace officers and correctional officers.

Robinson currently serves as a lecturer at the Watts College of Public Programs and Community Solutions at Arizona State University in the School of Criminology and Criminal Justice.

Robinson and his wife, Dr. Michele Halyard, have three adult children. According to the Councilman, they also have two obnoxious dogs, a Portuguese Waterdog and a Goldendoodle.

False Alarms Are Costly

A recent study by Phoenix Police and ASU calculated the costs and frequency of false burglary alarms in our city. The effect is, well, alarming.

Scope of the false alarm 'problem' In 2021, PPD logged 47,078 burglary alarm calls, 2.3% of all calls for service, and in 79.2% of those calls (or, 37,296) police were dispatched to the home.

Actual number of burglaries is few Here's the key fact: of the total number of calls to PPD for a burglary alarm, only 326--just .69% of all the calls--resulted in an attempted or actual burglary.

What is the cost of false alarms?

The current yearly estimated time spent by PPD responding to alarms is 37,296 manhours and the cost is \$945,080.

These numbers are based on two officers responding to an alarm call, the hourly cost per officer set at \$25.34 per hour, and each call taking 45 minutes to respond to and complete. Costs are higher when including supervision, vehicle usage and record-keeping.

Changes may be coming

PPD may alter the current fee schedule for false alarms. But in the meantime, every homeowner should be vigilant in limiting false alarms in their homes.

To help reduce false alarms, consider using a RING-type doorbell to augment your existing alarm system with visual alerts and evidence.

What's the City Doing About Homelessness Downtown?

Seems like no matter where we look, we see the effects of homelessness on individuals, businesses and neighborhoods.

In response to a lawsuit filed by private individuals and businesses, the City of Phoenix has been ordered by a Maricopa County Superior Court Judge to promptly begin addressing the conditions in and around the Human Services Campus just west of downtown.

According to a post on the City's website, "The City has an action plan to clean up the encampment which includes adding additional shelter space, enhanced cleaning and offering various alternative locations to residents once complete, leading with services to offer options to those relocating and unifying our efforts with regional partners."

It is a regional issue, yet Phoenix bears the brunt of the efforts--and costs. The next steps for the area west of downtown include:

- •An additional 800 shelter beds coming online before the end of next year.
- •The City is also exploring creative solutions such as leasing hotel space to add additional rooms for individuals needing shelter.
- •The City is working with other government partners to identify vacant land and/or buildings which could be used to support those experiencing homelessness.
- •The Office of Homeless Solutions is also exploring creating a safe, outdoor space with restrooms, 24/7 security, onsite services and shade for those who may not be ready to accept an indoor shelter option.

Meet Mountain View Commander Leif Myers

Commander Leif Myers, a 25-year veteran of the Phoenix Police Department, has been appointed to lead our local Mountain View Precinct. Myers is responsible for managing more than 200 sworn officers and civilians to serve more than 230,000 residents of the precinct.

During his career, Myers has had varied assignments and responsibilities including working in the Maryvale Precinct as a Sergeant and as a Lieutenant in the Desert Horizon Precinct where his focus was on community-based policing.

Myers was also a motorcycle cop assigned to traffic enforcement. One of his assignments was in the vehicular crimes unit. "You can solve a lot of problems with traffic enforcement," he said. "And when you put together an investigation that gets impaired drivers off the road, there's a lot of pride behind those investigations," Myers added.

What does Myers think about the Mountain View Precinct? "It's an honor



and a privilege to be working with a dedicated staff and to be joining up with our neighborhood partners," he said. Myers sees crime reduction efforts as a driving force, but "it's not just the police department--we work best when we partner with the multiple stakeholders to address problems."

Here's some great suggestions for bird-friendly backyards from the Audobon Society.



Update: DOJ Inquiry



In August 2021, the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) announced that it is conducting a Civil Pattern or Practice inquiry into the Phoenix Police Department (PPD).

Since the announcement, DOJ has been investigating PPD through the request for data and policies and by interviewing sworn officers.

PPD has been transparent with citizens by meeting with neighborhood groups and by creating a web page with updates. You can visit that web page here:

Many citizens who are following this inquiry are appreciative of how transparent and compliant PPD has been with DOJ. Findings from a DOJ inquiry are not appealed, as there is no mechanism for that. One thing is almost always certain: DOJ consent decrees cost cities for years to come.
