

Sign of the times





Summer Safety Tips

So you're going out of town this summer? Great. Just remember these tips to keep your home safe.

• Before you leave:

Have good locks on all doors and windows, and USE THEM!

Ask a neighbor to watch the house while you're away. Leave your vacation contact info with family or a neighbor so you can be reached in case of an emergency.
Never leave your house keys

hidden outside your home.

• **Stop all deliveries**, or arrange for a neighbor to pick up your mail, newspapers and packages.

• Arrange for someone to mow your lawn & maintain the yard to give the home a lived-in look.

• **Plug in timers** to turn lights and a radio or television on and off at appropriate times. This helps to disguise that you are away.

• If you have a landline, turn the bell or ringer on your telephone down low. If a burglar is around, he won't be alerted to your absence by a ringing phone.

• **Don't announce** your absence on voice mail or social media.

• Leave blinds, shades and curtains in a normal position. Don't close them unless that is what you do when you are home.

• Close and lock garage doors and windows. Ask a neighbor to occasionally park their car at your home as you normally would.

• Secure storage sheds, attic entrances and gates.

• Let your neighbors know to call the police for suspicious activity. They should call 9-1-1 and let the officers check it out.

Prepare for it: Road trips when the weather is HOT, HOT, HOT

Plan ahead for warmer weather travel on Arizona's highways. Take these hints from ADOT for safer road travel this summer. Being prepared is being safe

It's always a good idea to prepare an emergency kit for your car. It makes extra sense during the summer heat.

Pack items that help keep you comfortable and safer in case your vehicle breaks down or if traffic is stopped due to crashes, disabled vehicles or wildfires.

Some of the items to pack for warmer weather travel:

• Extra **drinking water** in case an unscheduled stop in traffic occurs. Packing water on ice in a cooler is also a good idea.

• Fully charged **mobile device** and **charger**.

• An extra **blanket** or two. You can use it to kneel on (instead of hot asphalt!) when changing a tire. Blankets are good to have on hand as a first aid supply.

- A well-stocked first aid kit.
- Hats, sunglasses, sunscreen and an extra set of loose-fitting cotton clothing.
- Umbrella for use in sun or rain.
- A paper **road map**, in case cell service is not available.
- Adequate amount of **prescription medications**.
- Healthy snack foods.
- Flashlight, extra batteries.

Take steps to limit problems with your vehicle. Get your engine fluid levels, fan belts and tire pressure checked to avoid spending time on a lonely stretch of highway. Proper tire pressure is important for reducing the risk of a blowout in hot weather. Also, check the condition of your windshield wipers and replace if needed.

When a freeway closure or other major traffic event occurs, the free app for ADOT Alerts, available at **ADOTAlerts.com**, will send critical information directly to app users and, when possible, notice of alternate routes.




